



SHORT CURRICULAR NOTE

Itzhak **WEISMANN** is Associate Professor of Islamic studies and former Director of the Jewish-Arab Center at Haifa University. His research interests focus on modern Islamic movements and ideologies, particularly Salafism, the Muslim Brotherhood, Sufi fraternities, and jihadi organizations. The geographical areas of his investigations encompass the Middle East (esp. Egypt, Syria, Saudi Arabia), and South Asia, as well as Western Europe. He has recently worked on the verities of missionary activity and the preaching of Islam, and is currently engaged in a new project on the concept and practice of interfaith and intercultural dialogue.

Among his major courses are Political Islam; What is Salafism?; Traditional and Modern Sufism; Saudi Arabia: Kingdom, Islam, Oil; Islam between India and the Middle East; Islamic Fundamentalism, Jewish Messianism; and director of the university flag course Religion and State in the Secular Age.

His publications include *Taste of Modernity: Sufism, Salafiyya, and Arabism in Late Ottoman Damascus* (Leiden, 2001). *The Naqshbandiyya: Orthodoxy and Activism in a Worldwide Sufi Tradition* (London and New York, 2007). *Abd al-Rahman al-Kawakibi: Islamic Reform and Arab Nationalism* (London and New York, 2015). He is the co-editor of *Ottoman Reform and Muslim Regeneration* (London, 2005); *Islamic Myths and Memories* (Farnham, Surrey, 2014), *Preaching Islam in the Modern World* (forthcoming), as well as numerous articles in the academic journals, book chapters and encyclopedia entries.

He is also scientific editor of *Sahar (Crescent)* series of translations into Hebrew of major modern Islamic texts.
